The Scout Troop.

Last Summer Camp was declared by many to be the best camp we have had. The site was almost perfect, a sloping grass meadow surrounded by woods on two sides and river on the other two. The river was deep enough for swimming, but very

cold! Senior and Junior Scouts camped in the same field, but each had their separate adventure. The Seniors went on a treasure hunt lasting a day and a night, ending up at the camp of the 11th Fareham at West Meon. While they were away the Juniors had a really exciting night game on a starlit, moonless night through thick, dark woods, ending up with a glorious general scrap in the dark just before the moon rose at midnight.

A new venture for the Troop was a mountain climbing camp in North Wales for those of the Seniors who could afford the time and the money. Five of our boys and two of the 11th Fareham made up a patrol who joined some forty other Senior Scouts at the foot of Snowdon. All kinds of mountain work was carried out--exploring the mountains, rock climbing with and without ropes, and wide games among the wildest scenery in England and Wales.

This term Fenwick Gale has cycled out from Portsmouth every Saturday evening to run the Seniors, and they seem to be doing good work; they meet at the Rover Den and work either there or out of doors. For the first time in winter the Juniors are meeting in the School Hall, as we no longer need a blacked-out room. Now that Dennis Stone is in the Sixth Form he finds time to work with the Junior Troop on Thursdays and is a great help in running it.

Two Patrol Leaders camped for a week-end this term on our Whitsun Camp site, and at half term we invited all the Troops in the Fareham Association to take part in a wide game through the woods of Rooksbury Park, which had been lent us for the occasion. The red bracken and autumn tints on the trees were unusually beautiful this year. We have had a similar wide game each year except 1944, and each time have had very good weather.

There is a large number of youngsters in the Troop now, so there is a good deal of training ahead of us. Some of the second class scouts meet on Wednesday in Manor Cottage for training in Morse and other first class work. Next term we hope to have our usual winter parents' night, and show among other things the photos of Summer Camp on the screen.

The Sports.

The Sports were run at the end of the summer term, too late to be mentioned in the July "Lion." The track was rough and difficult in parts, but nevertheless some excellent times were recorded and five records were broken. The outstanding performance was undoubtedly in the Junior Half-mile, which produced a terrific struggle between Ashwell and Rowe, both of whom broke the existing record by more than four seconds. Ashwell just won, having run an admirably judged race; Rowe has another year in this division, but whether he will find anybody capable of extending him as he extended Ashwell is doubtful, and this year's record may well stand for a long time.

Three records went in the Minors' group, a promising sign. Quinlan, a big boy for his age, broke two of them and may develop into a very formidable runner. The 220 was this year run over the first half of the track and this may to some extent have helped the runners, but Quinlan had already showed in the 80 that he was a

record breaker. The other record went to Jarmain who jumped the same height as Avis, but had fewer failures. A disqualification in the Relay put Blackbrook out of the race, which they should have won by a large margin.

In the Juniors the Half-mile has already been mentioned. In the shorter distances, Webb, Bass and Anscombe were predominant, and as Webb also won the High Jump, he had much to be pleased about, but School House team-work won the Cup.

In the Senior events V. Knight, who left a day or two before the Sports was much missed, but even so Blackbrook beat the Relay record, despite bad changing, and won the Cup. This was mainly due to Sapsed, who won the 100 decisively and at last got in a good straight throw at the Cricket Ball.

It may here be said that, with the Senior School, we sent a team which competed at Eastleigh in a strongly contested inter-School competition and did very creditably. Bass, won the under 15 220 yards, Rowe (drawn outside in a field of 13), was just beaten into second place in the under 14 Half-mile. Our Senior team, led by V. Knight on his last day at School, got good places in almost every event and finished second.

Football.

This term the 1st XI has not, unfortunately, been up to the standard of previous years. Although we started off the season with a good win over Gosport Secondary, we were beaten easily by Eastleigh and Taunton's. After this, however, we recovered in the two games against Purbrook and Portsmouth Grammar School, whom we beat. Purbrook, however, had their revenge by beating us on our own ground a short while after. This term also saw the revival of our fixture with Midhurst, with whom we had an excellent tussle, being 5-3 up at half-time and then losing 9-5. The last game to date was against St. Mary's, with whom we drew 7-7.

The game against Gosport was a very fast game in which both sides had some bad luck, but our defence did not concede a goal and we won by the substantial margin of 6-0.

Against Eastleigh we had much stiffer opposition and our defence made several bad clearances, of which Eastleigh took full advantage. We were leading at half-time, but eventually lost 5-3.

Our next match was rather a dismal failure from our point of view. Tauntons, always a strong side, were on top all the way through and beat us 9-2.

Next came the high spot of the term. In a hard-fought game at Purbrook we won by two goals to one. Our defence held together all through and everybody played very hard to bring off this win.

Against Portsmouth Grammar School, things looked a bit shaky for a time, but we recovered and finally came off best to the tune of 6-4, all six goals being very good ones.

Then we came up against Midhurst, who were a very strong side, and although we had a good lead at half-time, we went under by 9-5, scoring no goals after half-time.

St. Mary's were a very clever team who sometimes had our defence spread-eagled. The score oscillated, and after being 7-5 down, we scored two goals in the last ten minutes to force a draw.

In each game an opponent found a weak spot and exploited this to their advantage. However, the season has been a very happy one and we all did our best, even though at times it was not quite good enough, but I would like to thank our small band of supporters who stuck to us through thick and thin.

Thanks are also due to Thorburn and Winfield, who have given up their spare time to act as linesmen, and on behalf of the whole team I should like to thank Mr. Shaw for the time he has devoted to us and to Mr. Garton and Mr. Foster for refereeing so ably.

I would like to add a few words to the somewhat depressing account written by the First Eleven Captain.

Firstly, the season has not been one of unrelieved gloom. The two wins against Purbrook and Portsmouth Grammar School were particularly bright spots, and did much to raise hopes which were never quite to be realised.

Then, also, the play of the forwards has left very little to be desired, and if Cole has been the brightest star again this season, we more or less expected this of him, and in most of the games Young, Jackson, Cundick and Webb all played very well indeed, the first two being perhaps the best. In goal, Joint has performed his difficult task ably and at times brilliantly, and no blame can be said to rest with him for the number of goals scored against us.

This brings the onus on to the backs and halves, and it is here that the weakness of the team has been. I think it cannot be denied that the defence has just not been good enough. Lack of experience has been partly the reason, and we have not been able to find a really strong defensive player to stiffen the whole rearguard, such as we have had for the previous past few years. There was a most obvious gap between halves and forwards which was much appreciated by opposing teams, and too often a through pass found the whole defence wide open. This was most noticeable in the Midhurst game, but on other occasions too, one always felt that goals would come, and they usually did.

Otherwise, as Cole has said, it has been a good season, and it is the general experience with School sides to have lean patches. Provided that the patch does not become too extensive we must not feel too depressed. In this connection I must mention the excellent performances of the Colts' XI, which show that we have good material to call upon in future years. The House Matches too, brought forward many good players in the lower part of the School who have only to grow to provide us with plenty of potential 1st XI strength.

I would like to offer to Cole, who leaves us this term, the best of good wishes for the future. Coming to us from Gosport in the first year of the war, he has had a most successful school career, both on the field and in School, and we shall miss him very much indeed.

I can wish nothing better for School games than that the future should produce for us other footballers and cricketers who may have his ability and his keenness.

The Senior House Competition has not been completed, but it looks very much as if Cams will be the winners again this year, although Blackbrook gave them a good run, and were perhaps a trifle unlucky not to win.

Blackbrook were definitely the best Junior side, and deserved to win, and School House were creditable runners-up, only losing by a goal in the last minutes of a tough game.

*J. D. COLE (Captain—Centre Forward).—A very good player indeed and an excellent captain. Is very fast and has a powerful shot in his right foot. One of the best forwards we have ever had at the School.

*E. J. YOUNG (Inside-left).—Has played very well all the season. Is difficult to dispossess, and kicks the ball hard. Has been most untiring, both in defence and attack.

- *P. C. F. WILKINS (Centre-Half).—Has not found things too easy, but has done his best in an unsound defence. Heads the ball very well, and tackles fearlessly, but his kicking has not sufficient accuracy.
- ‡H. V. G. JACKSON (Outside-right).—Is fast and determined, and has always been dangerous. Delays his centres too much sometimes, but on the whole a worthy member of the side.
- E. R. CUNDICK (Outside-left).—Has improved considerably, kicks very cleanly, has a good sense of position and heads the ball well. His one weakness is that he is rather small.
- A. R. WEBB (Inside-right).—A keen player of much promise. Kicks accurately with his right foot, but must learn to use his left. Has found his lack of weight a handicap against the stronger sides.
- ‡K. R. JOINT (Goal).—Has played consistently well and at times brilliantly. Anticipates the direction of shots, and his hands are safe.
- E. W. GROGAN (Left-half).—Kicks and tackles well, but is on the slow side in recovery.
- R. C. PONSFORD (Right-back).—Heads the ball very well indeed, but is too frequently out of position, and could kick a better length.
- T. ASHWELL (Left-back).—Rather small for the position, but considering his age is a player of great promise. Heads the ball well, but is apt to miskick under pressure.
- K. L. SAPSED and G. M. SHELTON have shared the right-half position. Sapsed is very fast and has a tremendous kick, but refuses to use his head. Shelton tackles hard and heads well, but is too often out of position.

 THE COLTS XI.

The Colts XI has had, on the whole, a successful season, but it might well have been more so, a number of games that ought to have been won being drawn. This was mainly because the defence was too purely defensive, the forwards having to make their own openings. This weakness led to defeat at the hand of a smaller but very good Senior School side : the only other match lost was on the difficult Purbrook pitch. On the other hand some good wins were recorded, as over Portsmouth Grammar away and Midhurst, while larger and stronger teams such as Eastleigh and Tauntons were held to creditable draws, the former after bad defensive blunders had given away two goals in the first minute.


Packer, Anscombe and Harding all did good things in goal, and had their lapses too but a brilliant display against Portsmouth Grammar School ultimately gave Packer the place. Hoar cleared well, but is slower than a boy of his age has any right to be. Wilcox heads brilliantly, is quite fearless and fast and one of the most promising members of the side. Of the half-backs, Feast has captained the side well and has done much useful work, but he needs to develop speed, particularly in recovery and thrust. Miskin is a most useful defensive player, but his passes forward are apt to be wild. Hughes has done much quiet and solid work and by getting back

quickly has often saved awkward situations, and occasionally created them by putting opposing forwards on side. In the hope of creating a closer connection between forwards and defence, Biggs was taken from the forward line, where he had done excellent work, and soon justified himself as a half-back.

The best of the side was, however, in the forwards. Willetts and Jarmain on the wings are young and small, but both are most promising players: Jarmain kicks beautifully but is over-reluctant on occasion, to establish physical contact with the opposition. Gwilliam is probably the best player in the side: he has done an enormous amount of work, tackled players twice his weight again and again with speed and success, provided the main link between attack and defence and has been up in time to score several vital goals. Biggs, a trifle slower, has done the same sort of work. Johnston, unfortunately small for his age, is a born footballer. Hewitt at centre-forward, often without close support, has taken many knocks and scored most of the goals. Apart from a tendency to shoot from too far out, he has made few mistakes, has had hard luck with many excellent shots and is certainly one of the most promising players we have had for a long time in his difficult position.

During the war years owing to lack of petrol most of the field could not be mown. All Hockey Clubs ceased to function, and the Southampton Schools were evacuated to Bournemouth. The result was Hockey was given up. This term, however, we have had one ground fit for use, and although it is small and will only stand seven or eight a side, a beginning has been made, and quite a lot of boys—actually about a hundred—have had one or more games. Some have picked up the game very well, and considering the fact that several had only played three or four times, the second game on the recreation ground was astonishingly successful.

There is still much to learn, there is a lot of turning on the ball, and obstruction includes dribbling on the left side with reversed stick in almost every case. Then too, the ball must be stopped and not hit on, otherwise play can easily become dangerous. It is also essentially a stick game, and feet cause kicks and obstruction. In dribbling, the ball should be kept well in front of the body.

In the latter part of next term, when we hope for more petrol, we have several fixtures: two with Taunton's School, Southampton, each 1st Team and Colts, one each with Havant II, Civil Service, Portsmouth, and Winchester Town. Fareham, who will be starting after Christmas, and other fixtures will possibly be made. To meet these we have still a lot to learn. We may perhaps be encouraged and stimulated by the knowledge that this School in the years between the wars produced many players for Hampshire and other counties, and also the inside-left for England in more than one season, who in his first match did not content himself by scoring a mere goal or two.

HOUSE NOTES.

Blackbrook

In the Sports last term the House did not do too well, only securing one out of five cups.

The Seniors won the Tug-of-War for the second time in the history of the House, while Sapsed captured the Victor Ludorum by winning 100 yards and Cricket Ball. Scott ran very well to finish second in the 100 yards and second in the 440 yards.

The Senior Relay team with some very fine running broke the Senior record, while Newell and Suggate ran well in their events.

Knight, our late House Captain and best Senior runner, left unexpectedly a week before the Sports were held, and I am sure the House wishes him the best of luck in the future. Despite this we won the Senior Cup.

In the Juniors Rowe did very well, winning the Cricket Ball and finishing second in the Half-mile well inside the previous record time.

The Minors were well supported by Quinlan, who broke the records for 80 Yards and 220 Yards in fine spirit.

The first thing to mention as regards Football, is to congratulate the Juniors, captained by Rowe, on their success in securing the Cup. Quinlan and Cozens as backs presented a formidable pair to opposing teams, while in the forwards, Willets, Allwood and Keemer played well.

The Seniors, on the other hand, did not do so well. Winning against School House, the team played very well, with Ponsford and Sapsed in the defence, and Martin, Cundick and Woodnutt working hard in the attack.

The game against Westbury was a draw, with our opponents taking full advantage of some very bad marking in our defence to score three goals in the second half of the game. Against Cams we lost by a very narrow margin; with some really hard-pressed attacks by both sides, our scorers being Biggs and Woodnutt. The defence played a hard game most of the time, and with Hall defending his goal very well, we were unfortunate not to win.
