THE LION

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AST term saw no spectacular developments in the School, but a good deal of steady progress. The new Pavilion has been appreciated by everyone and we are all very pleased that our visitors, as well as our own teams, can be so much more suitably accommodated.

This term our Staff is being reinforced by specialists in Biology and Geography, Mr. Oxford and Mr. Chaffey, and we welcome them most heartily. Moreover, we have the use of four small temporary class rooms which provide more satisfactory quarters for our Sixth Forms. With the prospect of additional permanent buildings in the near future we hope to be relieved of some of the more obvious of the deficiencies which have handicapped us hitherto.

Fifty years ago this term Price's School was re-founded and buildings were opened on the present site. Great changes have taken place since then; great changes will take place in the near future. We may be excused for feeling that much has been accomplished in the past half century: certainly Old Priceans have played responsible and honourable parts in many ranks of life. We believe that the traditions of the past will be of value to us as we seek to prepare the present and future generations of Priceans for the opportunities which will be discovered as we move into our sixth decade.

Obituary

As reported briefly in our last issue, Mr. Shaddock died suddenly on May 15th and another link between the School and many Old Priceans, of whose Association he was a Vice-President, was broken. He came to the School just before the 1914-18 war in which he won a commission and served in Mesopotamia and elsewhere. He returned to the School in 1919 and remained with us until his retirement in 1953.

It is fair to say that, although he was the least obtrusive of men, he had a profound influence upon the boys with whom he came in contact. In his life he had more than his fair share of troubles which he bore with a Roman fortitude: fortitude and integrity and discipline could all be learnt from him and his pupils were not slow to appreciate his quality. For many years in the Corps, at all times in the Physics Laboratory, in innumerable casual contacts he moulded the minds of and set a standard for generations of Priceans.

His later years of retirement were made happy by the brilliant career of his son Christopher at Cambridge and it was a crowning joy to him a few days before his death when Christopher was appointed a Lecturer in Mathematics at the University of North Staffordshire. He will not be forgotten by those who knew him, least of all by his pupils and colleagues.



Speech Day this year was held at Holy Trinity Church House on Tuesday, 22nd July, the prizes being presented by Mr. Alan Lubbock, Chairman of the Hampshire County Council. We were honoured by his presence, particularly appropri ate this year, as the Chairman of the Governors remarked, because of the recent change in the status of the Schools and the expected development under the auspices of the County.

The Headmaster, in his report, paid a moving tribute to the memory of Mr. Shaddock. He was able also to report on the great improvement of the amenities to the School brought about by the new Pavilion, besides the usual activities of which a report has appeared in 'The Lion'.

Mr. Lubbock referred to the development of the School and of Fareham over the last two hundred years. The changes over that period had involved not only the material conditions of life but also the subjects of instruction and, if Mr. Price were to return he might approve of some of the developments but might well be critical of others.

After the chaos of parades during the G.C.E. Examination 27 cadets presented themselves for the Cert. A Pt. II examination and rather disappointingly only 9 passed. I consider this result to be very unsatisfactory but I wonder whether this time of year is quite the best time for the exam. In future I shall arrange for it to be staged at the end of the Easter Term.

Finally 60 officers and cadets went to camp at Shorncliffe near Folkestone and there we had a really good camp. The weather was for the most part fine, but only just. Still it only disturbed training one afternoon and, considering the bad weather about, we were lucky.

The high spot of the camp was the magnificent achievement of the Band in the Band competition. They came close runners-up to that famous school band from Chelmsford. A better standard of turn-out (very difficult under the conditions of the camp) and I think they would have won (Chelmsford have a special band uniform of scarlet). However, they did extremely well and the whole contingent can be very proud of their skill in music and marching.

Finally I would say a word to those who have left us. May I wish you every success in the future and I hope you will be grateful for some of the lessons you have learnt whilst being members (sometimes unwillingly) of the C.C.F.

Again this year the weather has not been kind to School cricket. Only two games were completely spoilt, the Gosport games were cancelled, and only a few overs were bowled in the matches against Portsmouth Grammar School. Apart from this however much of the cricket was played in cold windy conditions, and the wickets have generally been slow and dead, unhelpful either to batsman or bowler. Batsman cannot play forcing shots when the ball comes on to them with little pace, and bowlers get poor encouragement when there is no life in the pitch.

Results have been on the whole encouraging. In only one game was the 1st XI outplayed, and there may be some consolation that the opponents were the Old Priceans who fielded a more than useful side. The school bowlers had little more success against Kilford and Maidment than others had had in the past few seasons when these two players opened for the School, and our batsman were able to do very little against some very accurate bowling from Gillard and Gullick. There is indeed much to be pleased with in the fact that boys who learned their cricket with us can come back and demonstrate their skill so convincingly.

The only School game which we lost was against King Edward's School. This was a narrow defeat which we could have turned into a drawn game with some caution from the middle batsmen, but there was always a very good chance of a win, and the game might well have gone our way if one or two things had gone differently.

Purbrook and Northern Grammar School were beaten, as were Wickham; we were beaten by a stronger than usual Banks' XI, and we had perhaps the better of a drawn game with Peter Symond's School. The last named were a good side, and we did well to make so many runs against them, and to go quite so close to getting them out. The batting of Pugh and Payne, after a good start from Starkey and Evans, was particularly good, and the School fielding was keen and hostile.

In most of the matches the batting was quite good, and in only one game did it fail completely. Starkey, Evans, Dugan, Pugh and Payne were all very useful in turn, and Donohoe and Tudge showed ability an face of the disappointments which all cricketers get from time to time. There are some seasons when it seems that the harder you try the worse are the results, and there is little you can do but grin and bear it and hope—with some confidence—for better things next season. There is after all for boys in School sides always a next season, fortunate creatures that they are!

The fielding of the side reached a high level of proficiency, particularly in returning the ball. Some of the players can throw vast distances with accuracy and speed, and in many caess an apparently easy second run has been a dangerous undertaking. The close fielding has also been good and here perhaps the best things have been done by Starkey at leg slip or short leg, where he has at times performed brilliantly.

The principal bowlers were Evans and Ireland, helped considerably by Holden and Starkey and in the later games by Rowling. Evans has bowled consistently well for long periods with not very much luck to help him; Ireland's best ball is a very good one, but is seen too seldom and he lacks persistent accuracy—perhaps he bowls a shade too fast

for this; Holden would be a good bowler if he would learn to pitch the ball a yard or so nearer to the batsman; Starkey uses flight and spin intelligently, but is perhaps lucky not to have been punished more severely on the slow wickets which were no help to him; Rowling could possibly have been much more valuable to the side had he bowled his off-breaks earlier in the season instead of some quite ordinary faster stuff. Now he is developing into a good off-spinner with a very fair control of length, and with greater experience and more variation he should do very well in the future.

At the beginning of the season we were faced with the awful fact that there would be no Kilford behind the stumps. We have never before had such a good wicket-keeper and him we had for three seasons. The greatest compliment that we can pay Donohoe is to say that Kilford's departure was not noticed as much as we had feared, and Donohoe has improved so greatly during the season that next year we shall be confident of one position being adequately filled.

Of this years XI the majority will be with us again next year so we may expect another reasonably successful season. Starkey, however, who captained the side this year, and who has played in the team for three years will have left. He has had a wonderful record in School and House games, and we shall miss him. We wish him luck and success in his games in the future.

The Second XI and Colt's XI have had very few games this year. With the growing number of boys in the school we are now very short of playing space and matches were limited so that more ordinary games could be played. With House Matches and Sports the summer term is all too short and this combined with our limited acreage makes it very difficult to fit in everything we should like to do. We shall next season attempt to increase the number of fixtures for these teams as match practice is essential. There is no real substitute for play out in the open against keen opposition to test the capabilities of either batsman or bowler. The Second XI did have sufficient opportunity to prove that they were more than able to hold their own against teams from much larger schools, and Wharmby, Alder—an unselfish and keen captain—Schollar, Spencer and Emery all showed ability which in some schools would have been welcome in 1st XI cricket. The Colts too have many promising players in their team, particularly bowlers, and we hope will prove a useful reservoir from which to draw in future seasons.

There was some interesting and keen cricket shown in the House Matches, and in the Minor Division especially there were some very close and exciting games. There are many players in this grade of school cricket of great promise—I think more than we have had for several seasons. There has also seemed to be much greater interest shown by more boys and these things augur well for the future of School Cricket. We have had these last several seasons a record of which we may well be proud and I see no reason why this record should not only be maintained but even improved upon in the next few years.

1st XI Colours were awarded to Evans and Pugh.

The Old Pricean's bat was awarded to Starkey.

The Sports

The Sports were held during the week preceding Whitsun and a very respectable level was maintained in the Junior and Senior events. The Minors were disappointing and the recent spell of record breaking looks like coming to an end. One feature was the close struggle for the Victor Ludorum cups, in the Senior Evans, Starkey and Dugan all coming within one point of the winner.

Of the Minors, then, there is not a great deal to say but in the Juniors Forder, a big, strong boy won the 440 impressively and was deservedly Victor Ludorum. None of the others was outstanding but Shurlock, Wells, Pugh and Cooper were all more than useful, and, as most of them belonged to Westbury, Westbury won. Payne threw the Discus quite a long way.

Competition was keenest among the Seniors. The weather did not help the sprinters but seems to have been favourable to the longer distance runners. Evans, unpressed won the 100 and 220 in poorer time than he recorded last year. On the other hand, Dugan's time for the 440 has only been bettered in 1919 and 1952, a fine effort for a boy in his first year as a Senior. Starkey continued his economical habit of beating his own record in the 880 and recorded one of our less revolting times for the Mile. Brammer was moderately speedy over the Hurdles. For the fourth year running the winning High Jumper, this time Donohoe, cleared more than five feet, but the Long Jump was disappointing. The Relay produced a desperate finish, the fourth house being only two yards behind the first. This result was probably due to the indisposition of Dugan, which caused a last minute change in the Blackbrook team, and it needed a tremendous last stage by Evans to bring them in first. Donohoe, who performed very consistently. just outpointed his rivals for the Victor Ludorum Cup.

Short was disqualified after coming in a long way ahead of his nearest rival in the fifty yards breast stroke for not placing both hands on the finishing rope. The Juniors also finished first in the relay but one of the changes was slightly too fast. Dowse won the Free-style and came second in the 3 widths; Short came second in the backstroke and third in the breaststroke after he had remembered to put both hands on the rope and Holben won the plunging easily. These three were well supported by Joyce.

The greatest possible credit is due to these four boys and it is only to be regretted that their efforts were not rewarded by a win.

It remains only for me to thank all the members of the House for their efforts, and to hope that the future years will bring success to Westbury. I think they will.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD AT THE SCHOOL ON SATURDAY, 5th JULY, 1958.

The President, Mr. G. A. Ashton, in the Chair and 11 members present.

The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held the 6th July, 1957 were read and approved.

Before commencing his report the Chairman asked all present to stand for a few moments in silence in memory of Mrs. Ashton and Mr. Shaddock.

He spoke of the new Pavilion, erected by the hard work and enthusiasm of all concerned. The fund was started prior to 1939 and reached a figure of £1100. The appeal to Old Boys brought in another £460, and parents provided some £160, the County offering to help in the last stage. It was greatly appreciated, constantly used, and was a real boon to the School. It was in his opinion one of the best School Pavilions in the County, and he was most grateful to the Old Boys for their effort.

Referring to the School buildings Mr. Ashton said that next term would see the erection on the tennis court of four rooms, mainly for 6th Form work. The School membership would be 380 boys. 28 boys were sitting for Advanced Level, and 10 for County Major Awards. Last year the School gained 5 Major Awards. He felt sure that the work of the School was as healthy as ever. Next term would also see the appointment of two more masters to the Staff.

The permanent extensions to the School were well in hand. The Architect had been instructed to prepare plans and specifications, and these would soon be out to tender. This had necessitated a change in the status of the School from Grant Aided to Controlled, and while it had been sought to avoid this for some time, we must all accept that progress was inevitable, and the Board of Governors did not have the funds in hand necessary to finance the extensions as a Grant Aided School. This change of status would mean a reorganisation of the Board of Governors, and the new Board would consist of 10 nominated by the County and 5 from the old Board. He himself foresaw little internal change in the day-to-day working of the School, and very much doubted if the Boys would realise that a change had taken place.

A Vote of Thanks to Mr. Ashton for his report was then proposed, seconded and carried.

The Hon. Secretary and Tresurer reported an increase in membership for the year by 12 new members to 132. At the beginning of our year on March 1st arrears of subscriptions amounted to £23.12.6, and in view of the increased cost of running the Association particularly in respect of postages, he felt it most necessary for arrears to be paid up as quickly as possible. While he had no wish to recommend an increase in the subscription, it must be appreciated that this had remained the same for some years, over which costs had been constantly on the increase, and we were now necessarily working on a very narrow margin. Although our general position was satisfactory, the bulk of the Cash in Hand on Deposit account was in respect of Life Members Subscriptions, and should not be touched. It was essential that expenditure be covered by income and not from capital. Any surplus could be used to help the School in some way, and if members paid their dues promptly, it would enable us to do more for the School.

He then referred briefly to the main items in the Accounts, a Copy of which appears in this issue of the Lion.

The Sports Secretary then gave a short account of the matches against the School over the past year.

The Election of Officers then followed.

It was then proposed, seconded and carried that the Johnston Stick for 1959, and the Old Pricean Bat for 1958 be awarded.

Proposed Nobes, seconded Cozens, that the Constitution be amended as to Rule IX e. so that this shall read:—

"In addition to the above, the President, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Secretary, and Hon. Secretary of the London Section shall be ex-officio on the Committee."

Some discussion then followed upon a proposal by Nobes, that members of the London Section, not being members of the Old Priceans' Association, should have the same privileges, such as being able to obtain and wear the Old Pricean tie. Not being seconded, the proposal was not put to the vote.
