

Prize Giving was held on Tuesday, 21st July, and was notable for two reasons in particular. Firstly, it was the last Speech Day of Mr. Ashton's Headmastership and tributes were paid to him by the Chairman, Rev. A. H. Watkins, M.A. and by Mrs B. R. Dyke, J.P., C.C.; secondly, Professor W. I. Lucas of Southampton University, after distributing the Prizes, delivered a brilliant and most stimulating address. He spoke as one who believed that the Grammar Schools were producing the intellectual élite of the nation at a time when Britain's greatness depends, in the last resort, on intellectual eminence. It is from the Grammar Schools that the leadership of the future must come. Examinations might not be pleasant but they are necessary tests of knowledge; and the social life of the school provides a training for life. The contribution of the Grammar schools is to teach the art of living, to develop the talents that are in us for the service of mankind. As the record of matches shows this season has not been as successful as the last few years'. The weather has been wonderful, the wickets as a consequence fast and true, so that the only reason for failure seems to lie in the inability of batsmen to play the faster type of bowling which they met. In most of the matches which were lost this was definitely the case. Each of the opposing teams had a bowler of some speed and considerable accuracy, and our batsmen could not cope with this excellent combination. Our own faster bowlers lacked the second of these qualities and rarely managed to break through the opposition. Moreover, in nets they did not provide opportunity for practice against this type of bowling, with the result that sound defence was not achieved by most of the batsmen. The team was left without the two real essentials, accuracy in bowling and solidity in defensive batting. All through school cricket there was the same obvious weakness. Many bowlers had considerable promise and ability, swing and flight and some attempt at spin, but hardly a boy could guarantee to bowl consistently straight on a length. In the 1st XI Rowling came nearest to achieving this accuracy of length and direction, and with a little help from the wickets would have had the crop of wickets he deserved. But it is in the lower grades of School games that the foundations must be well and truly established, and next year more attention must be given to the fundamentals of good bowling and batting.

Apart from the bare record the season has been an enjoyable one. Many of the games have been full of the "ifs" which make cricket such an unpredictable game, and possibly we were a little harshly treated by fortune in that so many of the little things turned to our disadvantage. The team as a whole greatly enjoyed their cricket and most of them ended the season much better players than they had been before.

Evans has captained the side quite well, and both in bowling and batting had much to do with the greater measure of success achieved in the late matches. Donohoe has improved greatly as a wicket-keeper and I can pay him no greater compliment than to say that he suffered very little in comparison with Kilford in the Old Priceans' match.

Payne made many runs particularly in the earlier part of the season, and with a straighter bat will make many more. Tudge, Dugan and Pugh are all batsmen of promise and ability. Each had good scores from time to time, but lacked consistency and steadiness.

Holden and Baber bowled keenly and speedily but not with accuracy. Both would improve enormously with harder work in practice.

Colours were awarded to Tudge, Payne, Dugan and Rowling.

The Old Priceans' Bat was awarded to Payne.

Cams

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held at the School on Saturday, 4th July 1959.

The President, Mr. G. A. Ashton, in the chair, E. R. J. Hinxman and 14 members present.

The minutes of the A.G.M. held on July 5th 1958 were read, signed and approved.

The President displayed the plans of the new school building, which had been started a month ago, the first block to be complete by September 1960. He reported that even with this new accommodation the School would still be short of a gymnasium and School Hall.

Forty-one boys had passed at Advanced level last year and five County Major Scholarships had been gained, a most presentable state of affairs.

Mr. Ashton then spoke about his retirement at the end of the present term. His successor Mr. Poyner was a much younger man which he felt would be excellent from the School's point of view. Mr. Poyner had already met the staff on several occasions and had held discussions with them.

A vote of thanks was proposed, seconded and carried to Mr. Ashton for his report.

The Hon. Treasurer then presented his report. The balance sheet, a copy of which appears later, showed a healthy state of affairs. Members were asked to pay their subscriptions promptly and to pay any arrears as the cost of running the Association was ever on the increase.

The Sports Secretary then gave a short account of the matches against the School during the past year. He regretted the lack of enthusiasm which had on two occasions prevented a 2nd XI from being fielded.

The election of Officers then followed.

M. W. Gardner rose to say that through pressure of business he felt unable to accept nomination for re-election as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer. The meeting expressed their regret at this but passed a hearty vote of thanks to Maurice Gardner for all his hard work throughout the years.

Mr. Ashton then mentioned that Mr. Poyner, the new headmaster, would *ipso facto* become President of the Association. It was then proposed and carried unanimously that Mr. Ashton and M. W. Gardner should be appointed Vice Presidents of the Association.

It was proposed and seconded that the Constitution be amended as to Rule VIII—Officers so that this shall read:

“ The Officers of the Association shall be an Honorary Treasurer, Honorary Secretary, Honorary Sports Secretary and an Honorary Social Secretary, who shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting; an Assistant Honorary Treasurer and an Assistant Honorary Secretary may be elected.”

As members must receive fourteen days notice of any proposed change in the Constitution, this could not be voted upon but will be included on the Agenda of the A.G.M. to be held in July 1960.

It was then proposed, seconded and carried that the Johnston Stick be awarded for 1960 and the Old Priceans' Bat for 1959.

A hearty vote of thanks was given to Mr. Ashton for his services to the Association and all wished him a happy and long retirement.

E. G. Dimmer then proposed that a present to the value of £15 should be given to M. W. Gardner in appreciation of his services as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer for so many years. This was carried unanimously and the Secretary was instructed to ascertain from M. W. Gardner what form he would prefer the present should take.
