### VALETE.

By the preferment of the Rev. E. J. Tarbat to the living of Calbourne, Isle of Wight, the School loses a Chairman of the Governing Body who has held office continuously since the opening of the new phase of the School's existence in 1908. Few of the present boys can realise how

great an influence has been exerted by Mr. Tarbat during these years of growth. He has always taken the keenest interest in the well-being of the School, and when at one time an impression seemed to be getting deeply seated on the Education Authority of the County that it was eminently desirable to make as many schools "mixed" as possible, our Chairman championed the cause of "unmixed" boys, and triumphed.

As a parting token of his interest, he has presented us with a challenge cup for competition between the Houses, to be awarded on the result of each half-year's work, under a system based on that in force for deciding the House steeplechase, and, if the School as a whole will play up, his gift should provide a lasting stimulus to every one to "do his bit" in work as well as play.

That he will forget us in his new surroundings is inconceivable, and we hope that for many years to come he will be able to join us at our various functions, and keep in touch with the many boys who have passed through the School while he has held office.

It will come as an unwelcome surprise to our readers that the Editor of the "LION" is leaving us at the end of the term. For those who enter the scholastic profession, under present-day conditions, it is extremely difficult to get that breadth of experience in varying types of schools which is essential, unless one hardens one's heart and goes forth into the unknown before one has made a lengthy stay in any one school. Hence Mr. Jones' decision to seek "fresh woods and pastures new."

Under his guidance, the "LION" has become what its real function should be, a genuine School magazine, the greater part of which is actually contributed by the boys. In its early days, though outwardly far more imposing, very little of its contents came from the School, and

its finances were a constant source of trouble. Now, with the help of the Old Boys' Club, it pays its way. And we hope that many, whose first appearance in print has been in its pages, will, in future years, join the ranks of those whose written works endure and gain a wider audience in the world at large.

### CADET CORPS.

The Corps was inspected by General Capper on Monday, June 25th, in the School Field. Various evolutions were carried out, and, taking into account the very limited time available for parades, the report on the work done was encouraging.

At the General's suggestion, it has been decided to provide uniform for N.C.O.'s as soon as they have qualified for appointment.

The Range has been re-opened, and some shooting practice has taken place, which will be continued at the Connaught Hall during the winter, and it should not be long before we can pick a team able to put up a good score.

Since the inspection, over a dozen recruits have been enrolled, and if the new Fourth Form do their duty next term, we should start the year with considerably increased numbers, which will tend to greater interest and greater efficiency.

### THE ATHLETIC SPORTS.

The School Sports were held on the second Wednesday in May. A strong wind made the going difficult in places, and was particularly troublesome in the jumps, but did not prevent a long programme being completed.

With the exception of the 100's, times were not as good as last year, but this was made up for in the jumps, where there was distinct improvement in every class. For a detailed comparison, the "LION" of last summer can be consulted. Here, we can only mention one or two of the best performances.

In the Junior "100" Lewry reduced the time to 11 2-5 secs., which is almost as good as for the Open, whilst Troke beat last year's Junior Jump by 6 ins., although still eligible himself for the Minor events.

School House easily won the Senior Challenge Cup, and, with second place in both Junior and Minor, also carried off the Championship. West-

bury won the Minor Cup, which, with Poppellwell's efforts in the Open events, placed them second in the combined order. Cams just won the Junior competition. Blackbrook were never in the picture.

Mrs. Tarbat kindly presented the prizes, some of which had been given by Miss Bouchier, Admiral Moore, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Lusby, Mr. H. W. Smith, and Mr. Warner. Their generosity is much appreciated.

## THE WINCHESTER SPORTS.

Twelve records were broken, and six or seven equalled, at Winchester this year. Perhaps this high standard of performance helps to account for our returning without a single point in the open events—for the third time in succession, too.

As usual, we averaged about seventh or eighth position in most events, but although proving that our representatives are by no means the weakest there, this does not make any show in the results.

There are still grounds for hope, however. Most of our senior team should be here another year or two, and it only needs a slight improvement to make the difference between being placed and not being placed.

Christmas ii. ran very well in the Open Mile, although crowded out at the start; whilst Popplewell came nearest to winning a point with fourth place at the Jump. The Senior Relay team did good time for their heat, and would normally have got into the final with it. Unfortunately, we struck a heat containing two teams which were placed in the final, one of them breaking the record.

The three points we did get—and this seems to be becoming a habit—were due to Troke's thirds in the Portal Jump and Quarter, and third place in the Portal Relay.

## THE STEEPLECHASES.

These were run on Saturday, March 1st. It was a sunny Spring-like day, but the course had again to be curtailed slightly owing to wet conditions underfoot.

Individually, the Senior event soon resolved itself into a fight between Mundy, Christmas ii. and Chamberlain—three of last year's leaders. They got to the front near Roche Court, and then ran neck and neck to the bottom of North Hill. There, Mundy made his last effort, but on the final stretch was overhauled by Chamberlain, who had kept a little in hand. The time was 20 mins. 22 secs. Nearly fifty seniors finished the course

in standard time, and there was a close fight for the House trophy between School House and Cams. Once again the regular and general training of the School House pulled them through, for though not figuring prominently in the first dozen places, they packed thickly afterwards, to win by thirty points.

The Junior event is always an uncertain one, due chiefly to the large proportion of new boys. Daventry was again in the first batch off, but did not make sufficient use of his start to repeat last year's victory. Emmett, running very well, overtook him before half-way, and maintained a short lead to the end. As Smith ii. and Markham ii. came next, there was the unusual feature of the first four places being gained by the same runners as last year, though not in the same order. Westbury won the House Cup after a good struggle with Blackbrook. They also had a sufficient margin over School House to gain first place in the combined events. Their victory was very popular, coming after a rather lean time in House competitions.

## CRICKET RETROSPECT, 1928.

### 1st XI.

Played 11. Won 4. Lost 2. Drawn 5.

Quite a fairly satisfactory season on the whole, especially considering the fact that our four regular bowlers of last season had to be replaced. The best performance was undoubtedly in the first match with King Edward's School, when we were able to declare with 130 for five wickets, and perhaps the most disappointing that with Midhurst, when, after a recovery from a bad

start, we got our opponents out for five runs less than our score, and then fell to pieces in the second innings and lost by six wickets. Gosport was beaten twice; the first, a low-scoring match, gave us a one-run victory; the return was won easily. In the return match with King Edward's School we had the worst of a draw. The first match with Portsmouth Grammar School and XI. was lost, but in the return a draw resulted, though we had plenty of time to get our opponents out. The matches with J. B. Sinnott's XI. and Portsmouth United Banks were both drawn after even games. We defeated Portsmouth Secondary School, and Purbrook—our first fixture—was also beaten. Some of the batting was quite good, the bowling generally sufficient, and the fielding sound, except that some of the getting to the ball might be quicker.

### CHARACTERS OF 1st XI.

- \*E. G. NOBBS (Captain).—Has been out of form with the bat, possibly due to menace of examinations. Has generally managed his bowling well.
- \*J. H. ANDREWS.—As a bat has not quite come up to expectation, though he has stopped on occasions when others have left. A bit inclined to let the ball hit the bat and to push the ball instead of hitting it. Can bowl a useful ball.
- \*D. H. S. SWINSTEAD.—Has been one of the most consistent bats in the team; watches the ball well and is in good time (sometimes too early) to make his strokes. As a wicket-keeper, takes the ball well, but must learn to stump.
- \*G. EDMUNDS.—Made a useful century in the return match with Gosport. Has quite a fair defence, and can cut well behind point. A good field.
- \*E. W. CHRISTMAS.—Played a good innings against King Edward's School, when a stand was wanted; but has not come on much since. Must start quicker for the ball in fielding.
- \*R. LEWRY.—A steady bat, who takes a lot of pains, but crouches too much over his strokes, and must learn to get a freer style. Has bowled accurately in most matches. A good field.
- \*F. TROKE.—Can hit well and should turn into a forcing bat. Must not bowl beyond his strength. A sound field.
- \*J. F. CHRISTMAS. As a medium-paced bowler keeps a good length and turns a little from the off. When he learns to vary pace and flight, will be very useful. As a bat has some strokes, but tries to put too many round to leg.

†E. E. WHEELER.—Is quick in the field and has taken some good catches. As a bowler, is apt to get short. His batting has improved since the beginning of the season.

†J. RICHES.—A useful, though rather erratic, change bowler. A fair field. As a bat is not afraid to hit, but must get out of cross-shots.

†L. G. CHAMBERLAIN.—Must learn to play a straight bat. Quite a good field.

P. MUNDY and W. MITCHELL have both also played.
